

Students, teachers and staff have flourished this year in their new learning and work spaces.


The new buildings include teaching spaces, performance studios for music, drama and dance, art workrooms, music practice rooms, a new library, a wellbeing hub, a staff room and meeting rooms, a new reception area and work spaces for administration staff, and a whare.

Head of Learning for Year 7 Tiffany Kemp says: "The new flexible spaces have helped promote stronger relationships between teachers and students. Our students can work with four teachers as part of a learning hāpori (community) and benefit from having access to a mix of teachers with varied interests, passions and expertise. Thanks to the flexibility of the space, we have been able to organise the learning environment to cater to our students' different learning styles."

Head of Learning for Year 8 Kate Brown says: "This year, we have seen students creating spaces that support their learning whether it be working in a group, in a large meeting area, with a partner in a quiet space, or in a cafe-style booth on their own. We also have a dedicated area that allows for creativity, innovation and big projects, and smaller break-out spaces students can use for quiet reflection or where students can receive one-on-one personalised support from a teacher. The new learning spaces have allowed teachers to share best practice approaches and ideas which means we can make the most of the strengths of our staff and learn from each other."

Year 8 student Tyler Coombs says: "We've done lots of independent learning in this space. The teachers explain what we need to do and they are always here to help us if we need it but you can go off and get your work done. The colours make you feel relaxed and calm and because I don't feel stressed, I can concentrate better."

Year 8 student Casey Knights-Johnson says: "The new learning spaces have helped me learn better and I've really enjoyed having two teachers in my learning space. If one of them is busy, I can rely on the other one and they can teach us different things in different styles. I love working in our new space because it's really open, the light shines through, and you can see over the whole school so it makes learning fun, not boring."



LIBRARY 2023

It's been a year of big changes for the library. As well as moving into the new space, we have recruited an enthusiastic and dedicated team of 26 student librarians who contribute to the running of the library at break times. We have also been supported by Students in the Community volunteers Max Carter, Caleb Turner and Oscar Waddington, and HQ work experience student Zac Scott. With the help of our student volunteers, we have processed more than 1000 new books to add to our collection.

For the first time, this year we gathered a team of keen readers in Year 9 to contest the Otago Readers' Cup competition. Our team of Ivy Adams, Olivia Coad, Dani Maguire and Zoe Waddington was the only team to achieve a clear round but ultimately came in second. Our digital collection on Wheelers ePlatform has also been enhanced. Students (and staff) can now access more than 1150 eAudiobooks and 2350 eBooks, including a carefully curated wellness collection designed to support students' mental health and wellbeing.

This year, we supported Schools' Pride Week by screening diverse cartoons and hosting in-library displays. We also supported the month-long 'Out on the Shelves' campaign in June with our colourful Read with Pride display. Other displays promoted 'Bullying-Free NZ Week' and 'Pink Shirt Day', prize-winning books from the New Zealand Book Awards for Children and Young Adults, and 'Mental Health Awareness Week'. We celebrated 'Aotearoa New Zealand School Library Week' in August with a range of activities and competitions and were delighted with the wholehearted response from our community.

We love hosting chess club every Tuesday in the library and our chess sets are among our most popular borrowable items. We continue to organise loans from the National Library to support teaching and learning across the curriculum and write weekly articles for the school newsletter to keep our community updated on happenings in the library. 
Daisy



















HOSTEL CHAT 2023



STICKS 'N STONES

Sticks 'n Stones is a youth-led bullying prevention programme that supports students to grow their emotional- and self-awareness so they can stand up for themselves and for others. In Years 7 and 8, our students undertake the programme with a session each week over two terms. Our Sticks 'n Stones Advocate group comprises students from all year levels and advocates meet in Hapori 1 on Mondays at lunchtime.

Sticks 'n Stones focuses on hearing students' voices and supporting students' ideas and has used this approach in their Ambassador programmes for all Years 7 and 8 students, as well as codesigning research alongside a group of students to explore junior school students' experiences of bullying.



This year, the student advocate group facilitated classes for the Years 7 and 8 students and produced a number of podcasts. The group also ran Pink Shirt Day which raised awareness of the message that bullying is not okay and encouraged people to be active bystanders and do something about bullying when they see it happening. The advocate group has also set up geocaching sites around Wānaka where little treasures can be found with supportive messages.

STUDENTS IN THE COMMUNITY

Our Year 13 students have done us proud once again!

They have given more than 3000 hours to lend a hand in our Upper Clutha community. The Students in the Community programme has been running for over 20 years and is well supported by local organisations.

Term 1 is always a busy time in the programme with the number of large-scale events held in Wānaka in February and March. Students gain a lot of hours in this term by volunteering at 'Challenge Wānaka', 'Motatapu' and 'Spirited Women' sporting events. They take on a variety of different roles at the A&P Show and volunteer at the biennial 'Festival of Colour'.

This year, to support those affected by cancer, a group of Year 13s took on the role of activities coordinator for the 'Relay for Life', preparing entertainment for participants to keep their energy and spirits up. Others supported the Breast Cancer Society by helping organisers at the 'NZ House and Garden' tours.

Once winter sports start to rev up, we have our Year 13s dotted around sports clubs coaching, managing, umpiring and time-keeping. We also have students who regularly get involved in activities with the public library, primary schools and preschools.

Within our own school community, the students have set up coding and robotics clubs, and a Spanish club where senior students can use their skills to teach younger groups. They also take part in activities with students from HQ and have a buddy system set up for mentoring students in Years 7 and 8.

Students' success in the programme has always been measured by the number of hours given, with students who achieve more than 50 receiving a distinction certificate at senior prizegiving. Some students, however, go above and beyond and show initiative, leadership and selflessness. This year we have had a student volunteer over 100 hours with the fire service. We also have students working with the M!nt Charitable Trust crew with music, fitness and a range of outdoor activities. Another student took on the responsibility of student coordinator for 'Food for Love'. We are proud of the efforts of all our students in this programme, and even more so when students take the opportunities further and show real altruism.

We are extremely grateful to the amazing organisations we work with in our community and we are pleased to be able to volunteer within a large number of areas and reach a range of ages and cultures. In the coming year, we will be making some changes to the programme which will include the involvement of more year groups - so watch this space!



The William Pike Challenge is now in its fifth year at MAC and is getting more popular every year. In 2023, we had a group of more than 50 Year 8 students who have remained committed to the challenge. It is quite a commitment as each student needs to complete and log 20 hours of community service, 20 hours of passion projects and 5 or more outdoor activities.

As a group, this year's students gave more than 1000 hours of service to our community. The service projects included:

- working in community gardens
- baking for fundraising sales
- coaching and refereeing sports
- · library volunteering
- · tree planting and nursery
- grebe care
- bike track maintenance
- food bank service
- aged care service
- food for love
- sports event assistance.

Students undertook a range of passion projects, including: learning new sports (kayaking, surfing, go-karting, sailing, boogie boarding, cross country skiing, scootering, rowing, gym, skate-boarding, trampolining, football, orienteering, dance) crafts, skills and hobbies (baking, photography, crochet, cooking, jewellery making, art, sewing, gardening, knitting, puppy training, carving, coding, boat restoration, portraiture, creative writing, bike building),languages (Spanish, Dutch, French), music (drums, piano, quitar, bass).

Outdoor activities are group challenges, and this year students have been able to opt in to activities such as whitewater rafting, rogaining (orienteering), cross country skiing, snowshoeing and bush walking.

A highlight this year was when the man himself, William Pike, came to MAC in Term 3 for a live presentation to our MAC students about his own life story and what inspired him to establish the William Pike challenge.



40 HOUR CHALLENGE

Mount Aspiring College students challenged themselves in various ways in mid-June to support World Vision's efforts to bring life-changing clean water to children in Malawi and other tough places.

School-based activities run by the student committee included a movie night in the gym for Years 7 to 10 students, a bake sale, a sponsored breakfast for staff, a disco for Years 7 and 8 students and a DJ set at lunchtime. Individually, students' efforts ranged from fasting for 40 hours to walking 40km or 40,000 steps, summiting Mt Iron 40 times, distributing 40 rocks painted with kindness messages around Wānaka, and jumping off the jetty into the lake 40 times.

Everyone enjoyed their activity and was proud to continue MAC's long-time involvement with this charity. Justin Lam won the Skydive Wānaka voucher as the highest individual fundraiser.

World Vision Youth Ambassador Emily Ridd visited in August and presented committee members with a Silver fundraising award for the \$7,464.67 raised and also surprised committee members with the Auahatanga Most Creative Fundraising Award. James Watson will travel to Auckland in January to attend the World Vision Senior Scholarship Summit and will bring the skills he learns to the 2024 MAC 40-Hour Challenge.



Our kapa haka students have shown real dedication in attending weekly and weekend practices for our many events and competitions. I am very proud of all of them and thank them for their commitment to our group.


NGĀ MANU KORERO





The Music Mix



Just because you can't see it, doesn't mean it's not there.

LUMA Queenstown is an arts, performance and sensory event that works with over 500 contributors to transform Queenstown Gardens and the urban nightscape. This year's event attracted more than 35.000 visitors.

This year, more than 2000 students registered for the LUMA schools programme which is based around what students can do to maintain their resilience and wellbeing at optimal levels. Using research undertaken by the 'Mental Health Foundation of New Zealand', students review the five ways to wellbeing, and reflect on what they do well in each category and which ones they need to focus on and improve.

Students were tasked with designing and prototyping shadow sculptures that looked like abstract shapes. When a light was shone at a certain angle, the 'activity' that the student had identified as

having an impact on their wellbeing - based on their analysis of their personal wellbeing - was visible in the shadow the sculpture created.

Olivia Shore's striking creation won the MAC entry for LUMA 2023.

The LUMA schools programme forged new partnerships with 'Patagonia' whose staff cast their vote on the final five sculptures, and Wai Innovations and Southern Lakes Engineering donated materials and time to produce the student prototypes in steel. These materials would have ended up in landfill if not utilised by our school programme.

Another fantastic first for the school programme in 2023 was that the students who produced work for the exhibition had their work returned to them meaning their work will be displayed in homes and schools for years to come.





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
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
