After graduating from university with a Bachelor of Agribusiness and Food Marketing, Sam was selected from among 230 applicants for one of three jobs with Silver Fern Farms, New Zealand's largest red meat company.

"In 2022, I was in a corporate livestock rotation for my first one-year rotation. I was involved with consumer-led, on-farm auditing, logistical Livestock allocations and organising on-farm greenhouse gas emission calculation workshops with Beef + Lamb NZ for the government's emission trading scheme," explains Sam.

"I have completed a year in a sales exportation rotation where I've been looking after customers in markets such as Australia, South Africa, Mauritius, the Indian Ocean islands, Fiji, and the Pacific islands.

"My job involves monitoring variables such as fluctuating exchange rates, floating production levels, external economic factors affecting demand and pricing, as well as logistics and executing the final step of the supply chain."

Sam says he is extremely excited about the career-based opportunities he will have in the future.

"I would like to travel and work overseas, including experiencing different parts of the world with my close friends and living out of a backpack.

"I'm also looking forward to investigating career opportunities in the UK, helping me establish a strong career foundation before returning to New Zealand."
